



Education includes Glenunga International High and University of South Australia (B. Business Admin) Married for Seven sweet years.


Career highlights include senior forward facing roles at Allianz Insurance and the Australian Red Cross Blood Service - presently Director of our family owned Food retail business.

# THE LARGS NORTH MARITIME PRECINCT From INDUSTRY, 1950 to MARINA, 2007

The site of Marina Adelaide and the Port Adelaide Sailing Club was originally occupied by

Sulphuric Acid Pty. Ltd. This industrial enterprise was formed through Adelaide Wallaroo Fertilizers Ltd.

In 1882 the Roseworthy Agricultural College was involved with the development of superphosphate, and The Adelaide Chemical Co. Ltd. was subsequently formed.

By 1899 it was realised that the need for superphosphate was in high demand for our agricultural industry. Phosphate rock was initially imported from the U.S.A. to Port Adelaide in 1900.


They trademarked the name "TOP" in 1906, later taken over by Incitec Pivot Fertilisers.
Guano was also supplied from the Wooltana Bat Cave Mine on the Arkaroola Station, Flinders Ranges SA.

In the early 1900's the, Tasmanian, Mount Lyell Mining & Railway Co. supplied and constructed the Birkenhead Superphosphate Plant with an annual output of 250,000 tons.

They amalgamated with the Wallaroo Phosphate Co. in 1913 to form the South Australian Phosphate Co, which later changed to the Cresco Fertiliser Co. in 1920.

Following WWII; Nairne Pyrites Ltd. And BHP Co. Ltd. Formed Sulphuric Acid Pty. Ltd. at Largs North and to supply Pyrite rock ore from the Brukunga mine near Nairne in the Adelaide Hills to the new plant by rail.

Over 100 years some 30,000,000 tons of fertiliser had been produced by the combined companies.



The New Acid Plant at Largs North, C1950



This new Acid Plant was bounded by the railway to the West, Willochra Street to the South and generally surrounded by native vegetation and estuarine dunes.

It also sported a social club and a golf course for their workers and families which occupied the area that was subsequently excavated to form the new marina. The main plant was located just north of the Marina.

Refined ore was transported from the Brukunga mine, near Nairne in the Mt. Lofty ranges, to the acid plant. At the time there were three x 27'6" diameter steel furnaces lined with refractory bricks.

These phosphate ores were heated to 950°C. Other processing facilities further processed the condensate to produce sulphuric acid for the production of super-nitrate (TOP) fertiliser for our State's agricultural production.

The Acid Plant was closed in 1979. Demolition & Remediation work was completed in 1987 and the site was left vacant.

In the mid 1980's the development of the Guide Training Ship (GTS) Dolphin was instigated on Snowden Beach by Pam Walter of the Girl Guide Association SA.

At the time the PRSC was in full swing and there was the opportunity for the development of this new facility which is still in regular use by the Guides as well as other organisations.

During construction Volunteers, their Families and other supporters rallied to salvage the refractory bricks from the Acid Plant to construct their new boat ramp.

This ramp has since been upgraded and improved in recent years.

In the 1990's the PASC was troubled by the development of the inner harbour, particularly with the construction of the PREXY Bridges which would restrict access to the club at Jenkin St. Birkenhead.

The PASC re-location committee was formed and after much deliberation and consultation the decision was made to relocate to a new marina to be built at the old Acid Plant site at Snowden Beach.


Significant funds were raised to enable this massive, significant project.

Dennis Walter, a Life Member and past Commodore of the PRSC, had joined the PASC in 1992 then became chairman of the Relocation Committee in 2000 that also included John Johnston, Jim Edwards, Allan Rice and Rob Golding.

Upon this committee fell the full burden of the intense financial and planning activity of the next five years. The Committee was determined that any move should not diminish the Club's long physical and emotional bond with Port Adelaide.

The LMC continued to insist that it could see no reason for the Club to move at all although it had rejected the Club's application to redevelop its site as a marina in 2000 and was unwilling to commit itself to the rent that might be charged once the area was redeveloped for residential purposes. It gradually became apparent that this was indeed the only site on the river that really met the needs of the Club.

By this time the Club's Sailability programme was a well-established and intrinsic aspect of the PASC's activities. Sheltered launching and retrieving facilities were essential for the success of the programme and could be best met by basing the Club in a sheltered setting.

At the end of July 2005 Deputy Premier Kevin Foley and Minister Pat Conlon announced that Cabinet had approved the project, now to be known as the "Largs North Marina Precinct".

A total expenditure of \$21.6 million was proclaimed with about \$3.7 million of that to be spent on the infrastructure for the PASC.

Due largely to the efforts of Dennis Walter, Chairman of the Relocation Committee, the \$250,000 that the Club budgeted from its accumulated savings were augmented by grants received from the Office for Recreation and Sport (\$114,000) and Community Benefit SA (\$24,400) and by a very generous grant from the Commonwealth Department of Transport and Regional Services (\$445,900) Our past Secretary Colin Adams also bequeathed \$40,000 for this development.

In large part this financial assistance was in recognition of the value of the Sailability programme undertaken by the Club.

Work on excavating the site finally got under way in July 2006. Over the next 12 months 400,000 cubic metres of soil were excavated to create the marina basin and its entrance channel to create the new Marina Adelaide on the site of the old Acid Plant adjacent to Snowden Beach, Largs North.

New roads were named after prominent members of the PRSC and PASC.

The following year the "wall" separating the marina from the river was breached on the 13<sup>th</sup> August 2007. The piles had already been driven and the pontoons and gangways were installed later that month.

Finally; on the 7<sup>th</sup> of October 2007, a be-flagged fleet of some 50 yachts and power boats set off in convoy to sail into the totally empty Marina Adelaide at Snowden Beach.

In January 2020 I was approached by members of GTS Dolphin and the Estuary Care Foundation for repurposing the Acid Works refractory bricks left over from the construction and renovations of the GTS Dolphin boat ramp.

Approval was granted to relocate the refractory bricks within the PASC area to preserve them as a historical monument close to their original factory site.

The deadline to do this was short; they had to be moved on the 1<sup>st</sup> of February 2020. Once again volunteers applied liberal amounts of "elbow grease" to further this project!

Due to the short lead time the plans for the monument were fluid (made up as we progressed)

There are also plans to etch some of the triangular bricks to mark the four main cardinal compass points.

There is also a possibility to repurpose old bollards and wharf timbers to provide bench seating too.

Any fires in the monument will require a permit; otherwise it stands alone as a new historic feature.
